Two tax measures pass as open space faces vote

Voters o.k. parcel taxes to support schools and hospital as property owners weigh \$175 million bond

Contra Costa County property owners vote this month on a \$175 million bond measure to protect open space, improve trails and creeks and preserve wildlife habitat.

"This county has shown it values open space and parks consistently," said supervisor John Gioia, who has been a driving force behind the measure. "We're optimistic. It's a historic measure. It is the largest open space funding in the county's history."

The vote comes on the heels of the success of two West Contra Costa County parcel tax measures passed in June.

Measure B, a parcel tax that will provide about \$8 million in annual funding to the West Contra Costa Unified School District, passed with more than 70 percent of voters approving the measure.

Measure D, a parcel tax that provides about \$6 million in funding to Doctors Medical Center to ensure it remains open, passed with more than 84 percent approval.

Like the two parcel tax measures just passed, the open space bond measure will be voted on by mail, but the election will differ significantly.

The open space measure is a county-wide vote, but only property owners will get to vote on the measure. There will be one vote per parcel with those votes weighted in proportion to the cost the

measure would impose on the owner.

Of the total raised by the measure, \$130 million would be used to acquire parks, creeks, watersheds, trails and shorelines, as well as be used for the preservation of wildlife habitat and the use of local parks and recreation.

The balance of the funds would provide maintenance to existing parks and open space.

The funds would likely be used to preserve the Richmond shoreline, expand the Bay Trail and expand Mt. Diablo State Park among other projects.

Single-family homeowners will pay between \$20 and \$30 a year on the 30-year bond. The measure needs a simple majority to pass. Ballots must be returned by July 27.

Fire Dept. issues orders to 27 homes to clear fire hazards

The Kensington Fire Department issued notices to 27 Kensington property owners warning them that if they don't address fire hazards on their property from vegetation growth they will be declared public nuisances and subject to costly abatements.

The California Department of Forestry and the Kensington Fire Protection District have declared Kensington a Very High Fire Hazard Severity zone. Under state law, property owners within this zone must take special precautions with their property, including vegetation management, to reduce the risk of fire.

Beginning in May, the fire department

began touring all of the properties in Kensington to make sure property owners are in compliance of standards for vegetation management.

The department identifies fire hazards from grasses, weeds, refuse, brush and other vegetation that's dried out and become highly flammable. If it finds the properties do not comply with the standards established by the department, it orders property owners to correct the dangers.

Among those standards are requirements to maintain firebreaks within 30 feet of any occupied dwelling, creation of fuel

breaks from 30 feet to 100 feet surrounding a structure and the establishment of firebreaks on vacant lots 30 feet wide along the property line and 100 feet from neighboring structures.

Dave Gibson, fire marshal for the Kensington Fire Department, said that since the program's inception there has been 100 percent compliance with notices and the department has never had to perform abatement because of a lack of compliance from a property owner. However, the fire department is currently in the process of performing abatement on a

The Kensington Police Protection and Community Service District took advantage of low interest rates to refinance its outstanding bonds, a move expected to save more than \$350,000 over the term of the debt.

"It's going to save a tremendous amount of money over the life of the bonds, which benefits all of the homeowners in a reduction of the liens," said Barry Garfield, general manager of the district.

Though the precise savings to individ-

ual homeowners is not yet known, Garfield said it is expected to reduce homeowner's individual annual tab by between \$11 and \$15.

The district issued the bonds to fund the purchase of property from the West Contra Costa County Unified School District to expand Kensington Park. Those bonds carried an interest rate of 5.3 percent and 5.8 percent.

The new bonds, which will not extend the term of the debt, carries an interest rate of 4.25 percent and matures in 2020.

property on Yale Ave. after ongoing discussion with the property owner failed to produce the results the department sought.

When a fire hazard is identified, the department sends a notice to the property owner and provides the date of a hearing before the Kensington Fire Protection District Board. If the problem is not corrected prior to the hearing, the board can declare the property a "public nuisance" and order the fire department to proceed with abatement measures.

"Our goal is to get the hazard cleared," said Gibson. "We always want to do the abatement as a last resort. We prefer to work with the property owner."

The cost of any abatement, including administrative and legal fees, is billed to the property owner. Gibson said abatements can be costly depending on the extent of them, but estimates at minimum they would cost \$5,000.

The fire department will conduct a second round of property inspections throughout Kensington in early July. Hearings for anyone who has received notices will be held August 11.

The Kensington Education Foundation is using the occasion of the reconstruction and expansion of Hilltop Elementary school to raise money to support programs one brick at a time.


The foundation is selling bricks to allow people to honor children, family members, recognize teachers or immortalize themselves.







○A Willamette Ave. resident reported someone siphoned \$46 worth of gas out of her vehicle.


○Police stopped a man and his son who had been spotted taking a "construction zone" sign from a site. The man said they took it as a souvenir. Police instructed him to return the sign.
